NJ Saltwater Registry

When it comes to distributing federal funding or having political clout during discussions with members of other states during fishing management meetings, our state is under represented since it only has about **140,000 registered** anglers. Other states with lower populations than New Jersey have more registered anglers and receive more federal funding than ours. When it comes to political clout, New Jersey can claim it has only 140,000 anglers while other states can show it has much more anglers than us even though we have a much larger population.

Some anglers are under the mistaken perception that they only need to register once with our state. Registration in New Jersey is required **each year** and it is free. There are fines if anglers are not registered properly and information about why anglers need to be registered can be found at the registry's website.

Report on NOAA's Efforts to Promote Aquaculture

Aquaculture plays a big part in our world's food supply and to learn more about it, I signed on to a February 24th ZOOM meeting with the title "NOOA's Work to Foster Sustainable Marine Aquaculture" as part of Rutger's Marine Seminar series. The speaker for this meeting was Danielle Blacklock, Director of NOAA's Office of Agriculture. The moderator for this meeting was Professor Doug Zemeckis who introduced Ms Blacklock. Ms. Blacklock proceeded to explain why aquaculture is so important to our country and, even the world, and NOOA's role in supporting it. She made the following points:

Global demand for seafood is growing and we will need an additional 40 million tons of it in 20 years.

About 70% of seafood Americans eat is imported from other countries and one-half of that is grown from aquaculture.

Aquaculture can give access to nutrient rich seafood for a healthy diet that can reduce risks of heart attacks by 37% and depression by 20 % if fish is eaten at least twice a week.

Aquaculture is good for our economy and creates jobs and helps to lower our country's 16.billion seafood trade deficit. It also creates export opportunities.

Aquaculture helps to stabilize our nation's seafood supply in the face of climate change that threatens the global food production system.

In the top aquaculture producers worldwide, the top three are China, Indonesia, and India. USA ranks 17, behind North Korea, Brazil and Ecuador. (Being behind a country like North Korea is somewhat disconcerting!). However, this also shows that there is a lot of potential for growth in the aquaculture industry in our country.

In comparison to other countries, our country's aquaculture industry is small but it is growing. Looking at 2018 statistics for marine and freshwater national totals, the value of this industry was \$1.5 billion, up 1.8% from 2017. Production was 680 million pounds, up 7.8 % from 2017.

By region in the USA – the Atlantic coast has the most aquaculture development of 41%, followed by the Pacific region of 36% and the Gulf States by 23%.

Constraints on the aquaculture industry include the regulatory process, conflicting coastal uses and social issues. The regulations to receive approval to develop new aquaculture sites are daunting with a myriad of agencies that must give their approval. Coastal uses involve shipping lanes and local land uses that would interfere with the space required for farming. While farmed fish are safe to eat, a number of people still refuse to eat it since they believe it is not safe or does not taste right.

What is NOAA doing to promote the aquaculture industry

in our country? This would take a lot of space to cover in a comprehensive manner, but I will only provide the highlights of them. Ms. Blacklock indicated that there is a Whitehouse National Science and Technology Council Subcommittee on Aquaculture with its focus on expanding aquaculture in our country. It will streamline the permitting process required for new farms, improve farming through science-based techniques (reduce disease) and develop an economic plan with local and state officials to show the benefits of aquaculture by job creation, grants and other benefits they stand to gain. Ouestions

Questions

What about farming for tuna? Answer – tuna farming has proven to be very difficult with very little success making it a costly endeavor.

What about escaped fish from the farms and interbreeding with pure stock? Answer- there have been some instances of fish escaping but not creating a problem of any magnitude.

Is the feed used in fish farms safe? Answer –for the most part in our country the feed is safe but in other countries the feed is not. We are looking at using algae that is nutritious and abundant.

How about storms? Answer – we are looking at various techniques to better protect the farms from storms including the use of drop cages that are sunk with the advent of storms.

Do you set up fish farms near oil rigs? Answer – absolutely not, because of safety issues and possible contamination issues.

Sea Lice - I wanted to ask a question about sea lice that are a threat to farmed fish housed in close quarters, but was unable to do so because of time limits to the ZOOM meeting.

Ms. Blacklock thanked us for taking the time to listen to her presentation and she said that she enjoyed giving her presentation on aquaculture to us.

There were 77 participants on this ZOOM call).

One-Pan Gnocchi & Shrimp Scampi – By John Toth

Ingredients:

- 3 Tbls. Olive oil
- 1 lb. gnocchi (I used frozen & it came in a 20 oz. package that worked well)
- 2 Tbls. Unsalted butter
- 4 garlic cloves finely grated or chopped well
- ¹/₂ cup of dry white wine or clam juice (I used wine)
- ¹/₂ tsp. red pepper flakes
- 1 lb. raw shrimp large or extra large shelled & deveined
- 1 lemon (grate it first to make lemon zest & cut in half to squeeze for juice)
- 1/2 cup chopped parsley
- ¹/₂ tsp. salt
- ¹/₄ tsp. black pepper

Preparation:

- Add olive oil to skillet & when hot add gnocchi
- Break up gnocchi stuck together & fry for about 10 minutes and tossing until golden brown (add olive oil if necessary). Transfer to bowl to keep warm.
- In the same skillet over medium heat, add butter & let melt a few seconds, garlic to sauté a few seconds, wine, red pepper, salt, black pepper & stir for about 2 minutes
- Add shrimp & cook until pink
- Return gnocchi to pan & stir
- Add parsley, lemon zest & lemon juice & stir a few minutes and serve

Have everything ready before starting this dish since shrimp cooks fast. Have your side dishes ready.
